We all do our part individually and within our own organizations and missions to move the needle on cancer, but there are times when collaboration can more quickly lead to desired outcomes. We were able to connect with top oncologists and healthcare leaders from most of Minnesota's healthcare organizations to spend a half day learning, sharing and looking for answers to an abysmal 4% response rate to lung cancer screening among those that are eligible. This simple scan can reduce a person's chance of lung cancer death by up to 60%.
